USS San Jacinto...The End of an Era

The US Navy will formally decommission the ship at Norfolk Naval Yard, Virginia on September 15, 2023. The Ticonderoga Class Cruiser proudly served the US Navy since her commissioning in 1988. Our Chapter's annual bestowment of a monetary scholarship to an enlisted sailor began shortly thereafter. Begun by past Chapter Presidents Walter Nass and Bobby R. Smith, the award process soon expanded to two sailors. For our support, the US Navy invited us to the decommissioning ceremony and our current Chapter President and Historian will attend to represent us. We will have more on this event as well as some special gifts the ship is returning to our Chapter.

and Outreach Coordinator with the Fort Bend Museum in Richmond, Texas joined us as our guest speaker in April where she discussed Usefuls and Contemptables: Characters in Richmond during the Republic of Texas implying that Richmond was a hotbed for some interesting people at that time. Allison gave us a new perspective on Richmond!

The National Road of the Republic of Texas

An Act of the Texas Congress, finally approved on 5 Feb 1844, created a commission of five men empowered to select a right-of-way for this road, and to have that right-of-way cleared of obstructing timber, and also to see that the necessary bridges were erected. The commissioners were directed

to begin the road on the bank of the Trinity river, not more than fifteen miles below the mouth of the Elm Fork, and to extend it to the south bank of the Red River, opposite the Kiamichi, or in our terms, from central Dallas County to a point approximately 130 miles distant in northwest Red River

County near Paris, Texas. Less than two months after the bill was approved, surveying began and was concluded 30 days later. Three of the five commissioners lived close to Paris, which was also home to the surveyor Maj. George W. Stell. Read more about this in *Old Texas Trails* by J.W. Williams.

So many things changed when cattle became king in Texas, things we accept as the "norm" now and don't give a second thought to. Free-ranging of herds, branding, cattle trails, barbed wire, competition for resources amongst ranchers, laws re: cattle rustling, and so many more that it was impossible to condense it all into a short

Uniforms of the Republic of Texas

If you have ever been to a historical reenactment event you typically see an array of diverse unforms and clothing. Not every one can achieve that truly historically accurate ensemble instead many try for a common or movie-based familiarity. However, an excellent resource for those that want to be as historically accurate as possible should reference Bruce Marshall's 1999 book

titled Unforms of the Republic of Texas And the Men that Wore Them 1836-1846. Inside, you will find detailed illustrations of a wide array of uniforms from Texian soldiers and Texas Navy sailors.

Mr. Marshall includes context behind his illustrations as well as the timeframe, circumstances, and regional differences across Texas that each uniform represents. In addi-

tion, a historical accounting of events throughout the Republic of Texas are provided. As Mr. Marshall notates in several instances throughout his book, "Only the state of Texas possesses a military heritage that includes the army and navy of an independent nation."

For those wanting to build reenactment uniform, this book should serve as a guiding light to that end.

San Jacinto Day 2023

April 21 is a special day to Texans as it marks the annual celebration of Texas achieving its independence from Mexico as a result of the decisive battle at San Jacinto near today's LaPorte, Texas. Driving southbound on Hwy 225, look to your east and towering over the refineries will be the tallest monument column in the world. Construction on the monument began

on April 21, 1936 and the cornerstone was set on April 21, 1937, while construction was completed on April 21, 1939. Pleasant weather accompanied this years event where the Son's and Daughter's commemorate the day, and the Son's formally announce their three Texas History High School Essay winners. 2023 represented the 84th time the SRT has presented schol-

arships to deserving students. Both Dennis and Rick represented our Chapter at the event, while Dennis has served as an essay reader/reviewer for many years. Mark it on your calendars now, you know the date, and come out next year to celebrate our Texas Independence.

Katy ISD Folklife Festival

The first Saturday in April is typically a busy time for our Chapter when you will find us at The Kenneth D. Welch Outdoor Learning Center attending the annual Katy ISD Folklife Festival. This past April marked the 37th folklife festival wherein the Outdoor Learning Center was transformed into scenes from the 1800's, as many demonstrations and activities of pioneer life were recreated.

Our Chapter has participated in this annual event since 2017 and it has become one of our favorite and most important events. First, it is a local event to Katy and has a Katy ISD focus, so we get to interact with both Texas History students and teachers. Secondly, strong attendance by the public makes this event a great introductory event for us and helps identify potential new members. The Direc-

tor is a past Texas History teacher in Katy ISD, a past guest speaker at one of our Chapter meetings, and a major supporter of our efforts. Last year was the inaugural event for the renovated outdoor learning center, but this year's attendance was equally strong due to pleasant weather that day. When kids and students stop at

our venue, they are usually familiar with the basics of Texas history, but not the details. Also, every kid has to stop and play with our cannon as well as get a picture with it from mom and dad. Another area we value is the diversity of Katy, where we have people from many different countries attend this event and most had never heard of our Texas History. As a result, we get to tell a whole host of individuals from around the world what happened here in 1836, and earlier, and their reactions vary but most often they are amazed at what we have to tell them. This engagement can set an expectation that their kids will learn about Texas History in Katy ISD, and come home to tell them about it. This event has become a huge part of our Chapter, so we look forward to seeing you next year.
